Supporting the life of the community

Pastoral Care

In 2024 the pastoral care team welcomed three new members. The team meet every eight weeks to plan pastoral care, discuss training opportunities and support each other. During the year all members of the team completed a course, Living Faith in Suffolk Basics, this included sessions on Being Disciples, Being Called, Working Together and Sustaining Ministry.

Members of the team have attended workshops organised by the Blyth Valley Team Pastoral Ministry Group including Listening Skills and Healing Ministry, and Rev. Judy Miller and Sarah Wallington Smith led a workshop on 'Prayer in Pastoral Ministry' for the Blyth Valley Team. All involved in pastoral care were re-commissioned at the team service on 29 September 2024.

Lisa Nickell Lean and Ann Pooley have started a bereavement support group. The first meeting was in February. Monthly meetings will be held, currently at The Stella Peskett Hall.

Discussions are ongoing around developing a prayer ministry team to offer prayer to those who would like it after services, together with more home groups/life groups in the parish. Welcome cards have been created and are in every pew. The cards allow those completing them to request pastoral care support. A link has been made between the pastoral care team and the younger families.

There is a strong relationship with the residential care home at St Barnabas where the team offer a monthly communion service, a Christmas Carol service and additional communions at Christmas and Easter. Revd Russ Gant and Revd Philip Tarris together with four members of the pastoral care team lead the services. The residents much enjoy the service. Sarah Wallington Smith and Elizabeth Tarris are both Trustees of St Barnabas and visit the residents regularly. In the forthcoming St Margaret's interregnum Sarah Wallington Smith is helping with some of the home communions

Eco Group

Our main objectives during 2024 have been to:

- Register with the Eco Church scheme. Thanks to diligent work by Emma Taylor and Judy Miller, St Edmunds has achieved the Silver Award.
- Liaise with East Suffolk Council (ESC) on the management plan for the churchyard. A successful meeting led to a much clearer understanding of the role of ESC in the management of grass areas, trees, walls and hedges. Our task now is to review the management plan so as to maximise bio diversity and wildlife.
- Create a new compost area. A licence has been agreed with ESC to position this in a corner of St Edmunds Green. ESC staff will help to chip tree and shrub cuttings as required.
- Assembly and workshop sessions with children from Southwold Primary School, using the 'Threads through Creation' theme, on caring for the earth and different habitats.
- Research low energy solutions for church heating

Children's work

During 2024, we have maintained the growth in the children's work and we now have around 16 children that regularly attend Sunday School. We also have a core group of people that are willing to help at Sunday School and we thank God for this provision and their faithful ministry.

The Sunday morning groups continue to split into two, with the younger ones meeting in the Porch Room and the older ones meeting in the Choir Vestry. This enables age-appropriate teaching. The groups are led on a rota basis, allowing helpers to be present in some of the services, whilst also forming part of the Sunday School team.

Our 9.30am service of Family Worship is so enhanced by the families and children who join us and the atmosphere is lively and welcoming. Many families stay for refreshments afterwards and enjoy the opportunity for interaction and conversation.

Parent and Toddler Group

We are pleased to report that the Parent &Toddler Group has flourished despite some challenges during the year. We needed temporary accommodation when the Arts Centre was closed for building work, and thankfully we were able to use the Guide Centre which proved an excellent home for a few months. We are grateful to Jill Horne and Mary Smith on behalf of the Guide Centre who made this possible.

Now settled back at the Arts Centre, we realised that, to enable the group to break even, we had to increase the entry fee to ± 1.50 for adults and ± 1 for all children over 6 months. This ensures we can continue to offer a healthy snack to all the children and tea or coffee with biscuits to the adults.

We have continued to celebrate events such as Shrove Tuesday when we enjoyed Pancakes and the Easter egg hunt were two very popular events. The annual Christmas party was again a success with a bouncy castle plus the usual activities including a visit from Father Christmas and a gift for each child. We are very grateful to the Town Council for sponsoring this event.

The group attracts local families with varying numbers each week in the region of 8 children and 6 adults during term time.

Welcome and stewarding

For the shepherds' story every child in the school had a part either as a sheep or an angel. The Good Samaritan was enacted entirely with puppets, several of which were made by Brenda Doy. She and Peter provide inspirational ideas and props, for which I am most grateful.

Our thanks to the teachers in the school who are most supportive and welcoming. If any members of the church have spare time and needlework skills, and would like to assist with costume making, please let me know!

So far, in 2025, two of us attended the annual Lady Day service which this year was held in Bury St Edmunds in the Cathedral. Several new officers were commissioned during the service to serve on the trustee board.

On Wednesday 9th June, a few hope to take part in 'The world We're Passing On' – a service of reflection being held at Fressingfield, led by Revd Alison Alder, followed by a ploughmans lunch. In July, on Saturday 12th, everyone is invited to "Tea by the Sea" in Southwold, using the URC hall. Website and Facebook

2024 saw a significant increase in Facebook and Website users compared to 2023. Our communications through Facebook reached over 12,000 people up from 11,000 the previous year and we added another 50 Followers giving us a total of 720 users.

The church website was accessed by 3,400 people throughout the year, up from 2,000 the year before. The online calendar was one of the most actively used parts of the website confirming to us how important this means of communication is to both our local worshipping community and visitors to the town.

We are concerned to ensure that our church is a safe and secure place, particularly for the young and the vulnerable. We have adopted the Church of England safeguarding policy 'Promoting a safer church'.

The daily life of the church

Deanery Synod

The Deanery Synod meets three times a year at different churches around the diocese. Each meeting had a discussion of financial issues, staffing and vacancies and an opportunity to share special events, successes or matters of concern in each parish, as these might be useful for other churches and focus our prayers. Each meeting also has a special focus when an invited speaker will address us on his subject and usually takes questions. The meetings are open to all.

In 2024 these meeting were as follows:

- Feb 19th St Luke's Beccles the speaker was Bishop Mike on "Making the most of Lent". He had recently returned from Kagera our sister Diocese. He spoke of the enormous warmth and growth of the churches there and how much they appreciate and benefit from their link with us.
- June meeting Holy Trinity Barsham Geoffrey Probert of Suffolk Historic Churches Trust described the work of the Trust since its foundation in 1973. At this meeting Revd Judy Miller and Revd Alison Alder also spoke about their pilgrimage to the Cathedral of Santiago de Compostela led by Rev Alan Perry
- Nov 7th at St Margaret's Reydon at which the special speaker was James Roll, the Diocesan Zero Carbon officer who emphasized that the call to net zero carbon was an essential part of our mission, concentrating as it does on caring for creation, ending poverty and seeking a viable future both for ourselves and the generations which will come after us. Because of the efforts of Judy Miller and Alison Alder 16 churches in the deanery were now registered for the Eco Church scheme with 12 having received bronze awards and 2 silver.

Handbell Group

The Handbell Group continues to meet on Monday afternoons in St Edmund's Gallery. With three new members the band is now at capacity. However, I would still be happy to hear from anyone who might like to join in the future. No previous knowledge of music is required.

The highlight of this year was the performance of Badingham Chime at Blythburgh Church for part of the closing service of the Aldeburgh Festival on June 23rd. This piece, by Imogen Host was written for the 22nd Aldeburgh Festival and was first performed on June 24th 1969 at Badingham Church by the handbell ringers from Leiston Modern School under the direction of Hugh Connell. The piece was found by Stephen Wells when researching handbell music. Permission was given for the St Edmunds band to purchase a copy of the music for their own use and for the one performance at Blythburgh. The band has also enjoyed learning another piece by Imogen Host called February Welcome which was written in 1980 for Barbara Brook and her handbell ringers.

The band has played for the Southwold Band Parent and Toddler Group on several occasions. It is always a delight to ring for the toddlers, and the ringers are made to feel very welcome. The band will shortly be ringing for the local WI group.

Visitors from UK and abroad (Sweden, Austria, Switzerland) have joined us during the year. This has encouraged us to learn to play tunes from abroad and occasionally to sing them as rounds.

Last year one of the band ran a short course on a set of hand chimes for a class in Southwold Primary School. Amongst other tunes the children rang Happy Birthday for a child in another class. The band have been very fortunate in having the loan of a set of hand chimes. This enables all members of the band to play at the same time, and also adds a different quality of tone.

The Sunday School children (and adults) have rung the handbells after morning service on a couple of occasions. They would be welcome to do so again when the opportunity arises.

The group manages to remain cheerful throughout the winter months, and it is warming to hear visitors singing along as they stroll round the church on a Monday afternoon! Birthday teas continue to be enjoyed in the church and in other tearooms in town. Thanks to all members of the group for their enthusiasm, interest and support.

Flower group

St Edmunds Tower

The eight bells of St. Edmund's church are maintained in good order and are rung every Sunday for the morning service, reminding the town that Christian worship is an important part of Southwold life. When requested, the bells ring out for weddings, funerals and special occasions.

A dedicated band of ringers practice on Friday evenings, in the tower, 7.30 to 9.00 pm. Several people have been learning to ring over the past year and have found it to be a very worthwhile exercise, the outcome being to join in with the band on Sundays.

Occasionally, a quarter peal will mark a special event. The bells ring for forty-five minutes, involving over one thousand changes, which means that their sequence alters, following a particular method. A full peal (rung twice a year at St Edmund's) lasts for almost three hours and it is a joy to hear the bells being evenly struck in a series of over five thousand changes.

Bell-ringers are always welcomed when visiting different towers throughout England. New recruits are encouraged to learn this skilled, long-established activity.

Church music

1. Choir and organ

We are hugely grateful for the choir's consistent and dedicated support across the year. Without their contribution to services, in leading the congregational singing and through the provision of a regular and varied repertoire of anthems, our worship would be the poorer.

The organ builders have also undertaken a long overdue cleaning of the organ chamber and have constructed a deflecting canopy over the 'choir' organ to protect it from any future rain or plaster fall. We are expecting that the instrument will be fully operational by mid-May 2025 and are hugely grateful for donations and grants received which have allowed us to proceed in a timely fashion.
